Eagle Scout's recommendation letter is a letter that supports a Life Scout application for Eagle Scout, the highest success in the BSOA Boy Scouts program. Under Section 2 of the Eagle Scout Rank Application, it is stated that any applicant seeking to join Eagle Scout files will be required to choose six (6) references (five (5) if the applicant does not have a previous employer). The applicant will then request that each reference writes a letter of recommendation to be sent to the Board of Audit of the District Eagle for the Evaluation. Like any letter of recommendation, the goal is to highlight virtues in a credible and succinct manner. The Boy Scouts are an organization based on values that emphasize leadership, integrity, diligence and other good character elements that are written in the Scout Juror and the Scouts Law. The recommendation letter should be written with its audience in mind and should include: An explanation of how the author knows the Personal Scout accounts illustrating the character of the Scout When possible, try to show, rather than tell. It is easy to trumpet the character of the scout, but more effective to illustrate with specific examples. Keep in mind the Scout Law and its 12 points, and try to imagine how the reader could connect your letter to these fundamental values. How to apply for the Eagle Scouts Become an Eagle Scout may seem a distant goal, but the first step is to register as a scout. The good news is that the Boy Scouts of America make it easy with online registration. There are more than 250 scout boards covering the entire United States, so you should have no problem finding a local troops. 2. Being a leader in your leadership of troops is a cardinal virtue in Boy Scouts. If you're aiming for Eagle Scout, try to take responsibility. Volunteers to help with projects, and let you know that you are always willing to help. 3. Earn your merit mistakes To qualify for Eagle Scout, you need to earn at least 21 credit badges, including 13 mandatory badges. This is not an easy task, so be strategic and set a long-term plan to complete this requirement. 4. Get tested and reviewed A review board is the goalkeeper for promotion for all ranks, including Eagle Scout. Once the explorer has completed all the requirements, it must appear before a Review Board, which will evaluate its candidacy for Eagle Scout and make a final decision. This is high-stakes, but take comfort in the years of preparation that have brought up to this day. Who to choose? The applicant must list six (6) references (five if not employed) who know the candidate at a personal level and attest that he lives according to the principles of the Scout Oath and the Scout Law. The potential Eagle Scout must provide the name, address and contact information of a parent/caretaker. * a religious official, a teacher/principal/school advisor, an employer (if applicable), applicable). Two other references. The candidate then contact these six (or five) individuals by telephone, mail or e-mail, to inquire if they would be willing to provide a reference. There is no requirement that claims that one of the references must be twenty-one (21) years or more. * If the boy does not attend a church or a temple, he will be required to write an essay that details the moral convictions of him and a parent / guardian will provide the reference (video) what is a letter of recommendation scout? How to Write (Format) Due to the Formality of a Letter of Recommendation Eagle Scout, the format and structure of this character reference is quite loose. However, it still has to talk to the character of the candidate, integrity, leadership and general results. While each reference varies according to the individual that provides the letter, each writer should review the scout oath and the Scout law in order to produce examples of how the applicant lived up to the morale and the values adopted in it. If the writer is aware of the Eagle Scout project that the boy has completed, or if they have familiarity with the necessary badges that the applicant has accumulated, they can use both to support their argument for his candidacy. Often, the aspiring Eagle Scout will send a package to their choice references that will include a module / questionnaire to serve as a recommendation, complete with instructions and a copy of the oath and the scout law. Below we have detailed what to provide in a letter of recommendation if the form does not be delivered to the reference. Introduction If no questionnaire or model was delivered to the defender, the reference letter should start like any other. The introduction should include the name of the candidate, the relationship between the writer and the Boy Scout, and the duration of their relationship. Furthermore, the author should provide a sentence or two explaining why the candidate earned a positive reference. I am confident that my son, Harrison Kowalski, shows the principles held in the scout and oath law in all aspects of his life. The first example above is a reference letter written by a pastor. In it the writer briefly speaks of the boy's commitment to the Church and his reverence to God, both show the qualities of a scout eagle. Our second example comes from the applicant's parents who show the constructive impact that Bsoa has had on their son's life. PARAGRAPH (I) of the body Some paragraphs of the body will process the qualities declared in the introduction and deliver, ideally, direct examples of how the SCOUT boy has exposed the quality and morality held within the oath and of the scout law. Here are some examples. Example 1 Brandon has always been an impressive young man on the day I met him for the first time. He moved to our small city, and in my English class, when he was 16 and had no links to talk to. Within six months, thanks to him experience with him with the boy scouts, he had established a group of faithful friends. The friendly attitude of him, continuous kindness and sympathy for others allowed him to integrate himself into our school community. It was 8 months now and he has not lost a visit. This is that he is more appealing is that it does not require money in return, and he claims to enjoy the afternoons who spend together. Note as the first example, written by a teacher of English, focuses on the interpersonal qualities of the boy as kindness, cordiality, sympathy for opposing opinions and loyalty. These are all listed in the Scout law. Our second example here leans heavily on the trust of the young man, who is the first law listed. Conclusion The conclusion should summarize the points carried out within the letter and reformulating the strong support of the writer for the aspiring eagle scout. Under the conclusion, the reference should provide their full name, address, contact information and signature. Example 1 Jeremy is a faithful friend, a member of the active community and a dedicated scout of life that will continue To have a positive impact on the life of the people around him. His progress for the eagle scout is a natural progression while he is already experienced by the oath and the law as indicated in the manual.
