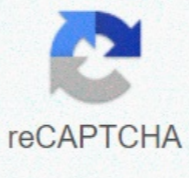

I find that when students are invited to sum up, many try to tell each event and detail from the story because they do not understand the difference between summarizing and giving a box. When we ask students to revisit, we want them to play a game of everything that happened in history. However, a summary is a short, short description of the most important events in history. To sum up a story, students must be able to identify elements of history: characters, setting, problem and solution. It is important to remember that synthesis is a superior skill that teachers need to model many times before waiting for students to perform independently. I like to teach my students to sum up using the strategy of Someone wanted but then (also known as SWBST). Before you start, you need to know what each part of the strategy represents. Someone - Who is the main character? Desired - What did this character want? But - What was the problem? So - How was the problem solved? So - What happened at the end? SWBST strategy teaching works well when you have already taught your students to identify the elements of history. It also helps introduce the strategy using some familiar stories: Cinderella wanted to go to the dance, but her stepmother wouldn't leave her. So, her fairy godmother used magic to grant Cinderella's desire. Then Cinderella met the prince and lived happily. Big Bad Wolf wanted to take a pig, but the pigs built their homes. So the wolf tried to blow up the houses. Then the pigs captured the wolf and no longer had to worry about him. After sharing these examples, it should be noted that some of the details were left out of purpose (Cinderella had to clean, forest animals helped Cinderella, the fairy godmother transformed a pumpkin into a carriage, Cinderella lost its glass slide on the stairs, etc.). While these are wonderful details for a pane, they can be left out to focus on the bigger picture of history. When it's time to model the strategy, it helps to have an anchor chart done in advance like this: As you read a story, you can write the book title or add a cover photo as a reference tool. Using sticky notes, you would write every part of the summary and put it in the chart under the appropriate heading. Once all the sticky notes were in place, it shapes as the summary comes together by reading the sticky notes from left to right. For example, in Widget history, you might say, "Widget wanted to live with Mrs. Diggs, but thecats didn't love dogs. So Widget pretended to be a cat until Mrs. Wiggs fell. Then Widget sailed and everyone was happy to have a dog around." In the coming days, these steps would be repeated, gradually releasing responsibility to students. That's how I haveThis process to my students: I do it, watch I do it, help you do it, I will help you do it, I watch when the chart is complete, you can create another chart or just replace the book covers and sticky notes with new information. If you plan to use the same chart, you may want to first take a picture of the completed chart and print it as a reference tool. Independent practice to ensure that students are using the strategy correctly, they need time to practice. For independent reading time, you can provide a summary bookmark as a tool. These bookmarks help to remind students to think while reading. Once finished reading a story, they can use the bookmark to summarize using the SWBST strategy.
