



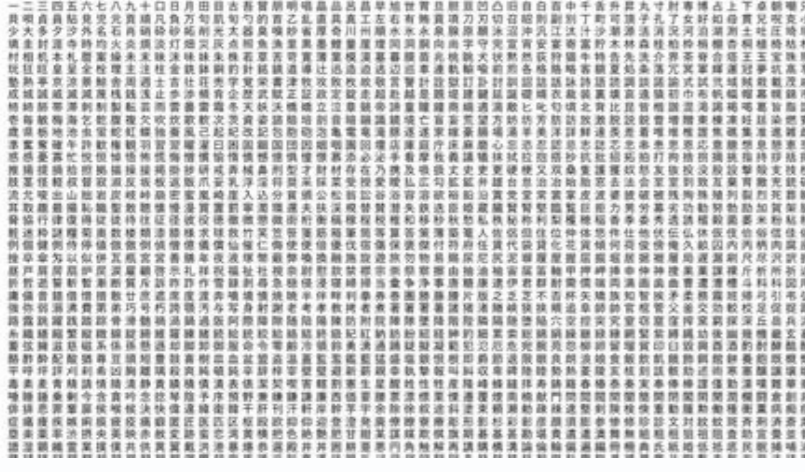
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After that, my memory improved a lot, but remembering Kanji was a terrible pain. I had to do constant tests, not to forget Kanji, and my pace of studying the new Kanji was glacial. Then I found out that Hasig has rebelled against Kanji. Enter Heisig's *ch* (ch) (Dragon recording) Although there are several methods similar to Heisig's, such as Kanji damage. Heisig was one of the first to publish this type of approach to Kanji research. The premise is exciting: Study 2200 kanji in a month instead of years. For this reason, we will recognize them in a logical order where we will unlock whole Kanji families, not teach Kanji in the order of utility or frequency, as we slowly learn more about the elements with which each Kanji begins. It is also important to consider what this method does not teach. By this method we do not try to learn how to read these Kanji or how to create real Japanese words with them. Let's look at only one key meaning, such as "risk", as in the example above and how to write it. You may wonder if it is useful. The use of their lenses depends. Let's try to guess how you read it (ã It is ~) æ o (ã ã) (postcard). This word uses the same "Leaf" kanji is 1/2 (ã), (ã\*) with the same pronunciation (although in the first case it is vocalized as if it were because of rendaku) and if you are already I knew to read æ (write), then voila, you just figured out how to read this new word. Now you can easily store this new word as well, remembering that Japanese postcards have writing sheets above. This is just an example of the power that will give you Kanji to learn with Heisig. When I started learning Kanji with Heisig from scratch, I studied Heisig with Anki's review software and this Anki flashcard set. If you haven't incorporated any form of SRS into your language studies, I highly recommend it.



Structure your research, hack your brain to improve your memory and motivate you to measure your progress. After completing these notebooks, Anki can be an excellent result with Anki. I was studying between four or five new cards each day with kanji on each card and saw the kanji while Anki gave me revision cards. For each review, I handwritten the kanji using the correct section order. It is necessary to write kanji with the correct section order when displaying. It made me lose my motivation because it did not give me any real value. The interest of the Heisig method is not to have to remember all the keywords. This is due to its ability to analyze most of the Kanji you meet in its components, which makes them easier to read, understand and write. This opens the door to something even more important, improving the acquisition of vocabulary. When you meet new words, you are easier to remember because you can recognize the Kanji, the word is made up of these facts and use these facts to remember the word. I decided to focus on this aspect and I changed my method. I managed to achieve this speed in the practice of writing images to keywords. Pictures help me a lot in my memory, and I no longer need to ask complex keywords. I chose paintings as a visual performance of stories. They help me recall stories and remember the stories of Kanji. I even use pictures that help me write. When I wrote, I remember the picture in my head, and then everything comes in place, and I can write Kanji. Finally, I stopped being a perfectionist. Instead of writing down the "settings" card with the slightest error, I just marked the card on Anki as "hard" and added an asterisk. If the card marked with the star is again examined, and I no longer remember her, I will note her as forgotten. Can I go even faster? The reality is such that, although I enjoy this method when I explore it, I am boring and leaving.
